Sindhu Darshan Festival (01 - 03 June) Leh, Ladakh



The Sindhu Darshan festival is a celebration of River Sindhu or Indus. It's one of the world's longest rivers, and gave India its name. The festival aims to project the Sindhu as a symbol of multidimensional cultural identity, communal harmony, and peaceful co-existence in India. It promises a kaleidoscope of Indian culture and an exciting array of performing arts.

Shimla Summer Festival (01 - 09 June) Shimla, Himachal Pradesh

### Nepal Tour Operators urges travelers to come-back

The Nepal Association of Tour Operators (NATO) issued a statement this week asking tourists "not to jump to conclusions over damage reports". "While there's no denying the... earthquake has caused significant damage across the country and damaged historical structures, Nepal still welcomes international visitors. The majority of popular tourist areas have escaped the brunt of the damage of the recent earthquake," NATO said. "Roads and air transport links are intact across the country barring some landslips, and most hotels and restaurants are back in operation. Kathmandu's Tribhuvan International Airport is operating around the clock," it added. "The destroyed monuments and cultural sites around the Kathmandu Valley and elsewhere need to be rebuilt, and this will provide employment and create a resurgence in traditional building methods," said NATO's president, Ashok Pokharel

#### Indian-Rural Tourism was recently promoted in events at London and Manchester

The campaign is based on a concept that was initially created in India 10 years ago, to allow cultural exchanges between the local community and visiting travellers, offering holidaymakers the opportunity to experience "real" in Indian life. Visitors are encouraged to stay with local families in rural villages and learn about local traditions and crafts. The concept has been now been brought to the UK market by Culture Aangan, a social enterprise that promotes sustainable rural tourism and grass-roots projects. The project aims to generate income for rural communities by giving villagers the opportunity to renovate their houses with sustainable features, such as water wells, and learn hospitality skills.



### Hike in Service-Tax will discourage tourism and impact hotel-industry

The proposed hike in service tax to 14% will adversely affect the hotel industry, a parliamentary panel has noted asking the Union tourism ministry to take up the issue with finance ministry for seeking relief for the tourism sector. The standing committee on tourism headed by TMC MP Kunwar Deep Singh in its report, submitted in Parliament on Tuesday, said India already has a higher hotel tariff due to multiple tax regime both at the state and the Centre. There are various indirect taxes applicable to tourism industry such as service tax on room rents, restaurant services, banquet services, convention services, rent-a-cab services, dry cleaning services, health club/beauty parlour services, internet services and money changing services.

#### New Tourism Policy in India to woo Inbound Travelers

In order to promote Indian tourism to a great extent, Narendra Modi has come out with a National Tourism policy 2015 draft. According to it, Prime Minister's Office (PMO) can have direct control over deciding the crucial sector that is expected to contribute 6.7 per cent to the country's GDP. Also, one of

the key co-ordination committee has stated that the policy would be under the PMO. Some of the Modi's ideas like Make in India and Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Smart Cities, International Yoga Day and Skill Development are a part of this draft policy. The main objective behind this recently declared policy is to increase India's share in world's tourist arrivals from present position of 0.68 per cent to 1 per cent by 2020 and further, to increase it by two per cent by the year 2025.

### Tourism Minister Mr. Mahesh Sharma launches 'Visit Kerala' Campaign

Union Minister of State for Culture, Tourism (Independent Charge) and Civil Aviation, Dr Mahesh Sharma, today launched 'Visit Kerala' 2015-16, a high voltage all-year tourism campaign that promises to present travellers to 'God's Own Country' a lifetime experience of the state's natural beauty, cultural splendour, culinary traditions and famed

hospitality. "Kerala needs to be promoted across the world," said Dr Sharma, who promised central assistance to the state to raise the profile of the state as a top tourist destination in the world. Describing "cleanliness, security and hospitality" as the three major ingredients of a successful tourism model, Dr Sharma said the country needs to propagate its culture and heritage around the world through tourism.

### Airlines

#### Vistara now operates from Delhi to Bagdogra & Guwahati

On April 2, 2015, Vistara took its inaugural flight from New Delhi to Guwahati. This new route marks Vistara's foray into the Eastern and North Eastern sectors. Vistara will now operate daily flights on the Delhi-Guwahati-Bagdogra-Delhi route. In a span of three months Vistara has already expanded its operations with the addition of Goa, Hyderabad and Pune to it route network. Guwahati, the gateway to the northeast, is the largest and most cosmopolitan city in Assam and serves as the starting point for most north-eastern itineraries.

#### Now fly to Andaman from Vishakhapatnam by Air India

Air India today introduced a direct flight to connect the coastal city of Visakhapatnam to Port Blair. The airline already connects Port Blair to Delhi, Kolkata, Chennai and Bhubaneswar. This new flight will be in addition to Air India's already existing flight viz. daily direct flights on the Kolkata – Port Blair sector with an A319; Chennai – Port Blair with A321 aircraft; between Delhi – Visakhapatnam with an A321 aircraft and another flight between Delhi and Port Blair via Bhubaneswar twice a week with a CRJ-700 aircraft. This flight will help capacity addition to this tourist destination. The direct flight will be a time saver for travel between Visakhapatnam and Port Blair and give a fillip to tourism and industry at both the places.


#### Virgin-Altantic connects Delhi and London with 787-9 Dreamliner



### Kasol, Himachal Pradesh


Kasol is a village in Himachal Pradesh. It is situated in Parvati Valley, on the banks of the Parvati River, on the route between Bhuntar and Manikaran. Spread out along the lovely Parvati River and with mountain views to the northeast, Kasol is the main traveller hang-out in the valley. It's a small village, overrun with reggae bars, bakeries, internet cafes and guesthouses catering to a varied crowd. It is an easy base from which to explore the forested valley or just chill out. The village is divided into Old Kasol on the Bhuntar side of the bridge, and New Kasol on the Manikaran side.

Kasol is ideal for a vacation if you want to chill in the lap of nature. The village is an open space by the banks of the Parvati River where one can spend lazy afternoons. The river abounds with trout and is the perfect place for angling. However, permission from forest department is required for trout fishing in the river. Parvati river at Kasol is ideal for white water rafting. One can also visit Manikaran which is famous for the natural hot springs. The hot springs is said to possess curative powers. Many pilgrims take a dip in the holy water to wash away their sins.

Best time to visit Kasol: April to September

### How to reach Kasol:

By Air: Kullu Airport near Kullu is the nearest airport. By Rail: Ahuj Railway station is the nearest railhead from the Parvati Valley





### Home remedies Indian style

### Toothache

Chew a clove or dip a piece of cotton wool in clove oil and place on the aching tooth for best results.

# Itching

Apply neem oil to the affected area. Or make a fresh paste of some neem leaves and apply externally. Boil neem leaves in the hot water used for your bath. Also eat a teaspoon of neem juice along with sugar for quick relief.

Cuts

For any cut or wound, apply turmeric powder to the injured portion to stop the bleeding. It also works as an antiseptic. You can tie a bandage after applying turmeric.

## Recipe of the Month–Wasabi Tikkis

Fusion is the new mantra in world cuisine: Tang brings you international recipes with an Indian tweak... pasta with spices and tikki style burgers. It happens only in India!

Ingredients for the Tikkis Half aubergine, thinly sliced 2 tomatoes 5 potatoes, boiled Olive oil Salt and pepper 1 tsp butter, melted 2 tsp wasabi 1 egg, beaten

1 cup breadcrumbs (Here Japanese rice breadcrumbs have been used but you can use regular breadcrumbs too) Ingredients for sweet chilli sauce 2 Tbsp honey 2 Tbsp fish sauce 1 lemon juice

- 2 chopped green chillies 1 chopped red chilli



#### Method

Marinate the aubergine slices in some olive oil, salt pepper and bake in the oven for about 10 minutes at 140 degrees. Make a slight incision in both the tomatoes and place them in boiling water for only 15 seconds. Once done, place them in some ice cold water.

Peel the skin of the tomatoes and slice them. Drizzle some olive oil, salt pepper over the tomatoes and bake for about 5-7 minutes at 140 degrees. Mash the potatoes. Add salt, pepper, butter and wasabi to it. Mix all together. Mix in the egg to the mashed potatoes. Reserve some of the beaten egg to coat the tikkis later. Make round tikkis (flattened round balls) with the potatoes. Brush the tikkis with some egg (you reserved earlier) and then wrap these tikkis in the bread crumbs. Deep fry the tikkis in oil till golden brown.

Once done wrap them with the baked aubergine slices and place the tomatoes over it.

You can serve this with a sweet chilli sauce. (Mix all the sauce ingredients together for the sweet chilli sauce)

# Why do Indian hang lemons and chillies on their car/homes??



Ancient India has a wide range of traditions and old wives tales that are carried generation to generation. There are fast track remedies for all ailments, like how to banish fear, fear of dearth, common colds, coughs in children, evil eye and frighten evil spirits. The Evil Eye Warder also known as "NAZAR BATTU" is used to keep home and businesses safe from all the evil spirits and let all the happiness be yours for always. This Battu or the "Nimbu-Mirchi Totka" as it is called, traditionally has "seven mirchis" (chilies) and "one nimbu" (lemon) to protect your home from all the bad and evil spirits. At home it is dangled at the main door, in business establishments it is hung at the entrancesometime changed daily, weekly or fortnightly.



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
